


# Impact Report 2024 June 2021 – May 2024

# ABOUT THE BRIDGE

The Bridge Youth Resource Centre is a non-profit organization that began informal operations in Leamington, Ontario in 2015, assisting youth 14 to 24 by providing a safe, welcoming space for help with food, housing, jobs, addiction, mental health, and more. The Bridge exists to "bridge the gap" by providing youth with resources and hope for the future. Within the first 5 years of formal operations, The Bridge opened its Resource Centre, a 24/7 supportive housing facility, built 12 homes, and became debt-free while initiating new programming. The organization has successfully received multiple grants and secured a partnership with the County of Essex to support on-going annual funding for the Supportive Housing Program as well as operating costs for the Rapid Housing Initiative grant homes.

Our work is guided by the following vision, mission and steps to success:



All told, since 2021, an average of 311 youth have come through the doors at The Bridge each year and receive a warm welcome and the supports they need. We are proud of the work we have done and are looking forward to continuing this work into the future!



# SUPPORT



A welcoming space...


At The Bridge, we provide a welcoming space. Our Resource Centre offers that welcome for all youth in the community. Here they will find our Drop-in Program and a range of essential services.

# **Resource Centre**


#### Over the years, our numbers have grown...

From 2022 to 2023, visits to the Resource Centre almost doubled. The number of visits was only slightly lower in 2024. In all, there have been 10,124 visits to the Resource Centre since 2021, with 100 to 200 youth using the Centre on any given month. Half of the youth visiting the Resource Centre become ongoing users of the Centre.




#### ...and youth using the Resource Centre are increasingly diverse.

Over the past three years, the average Centre user has been 17 years of age. Users include youth with a range of gender and sexual identities, as well as those who identify as Black, as persons of colour, as First Nations, Innuit or Metis, as Francophone or as someone with a disability.



#### At the Resource Centre, youth get help with basic needs.


Some youth who come to the Resource Centre are struggling with basic needs. The Bridge provides access to showers, laundry facilities, and a clothing closet, as well as nutrition supports. Use of our food pantry almost doubled from 2022 to 2024 and an average of 2,622 hot meals have been provided annually.



#### We also partner up to bring employment opportunities to our youth.

Connecting youth to employment is part of the wrap-around approach that The Bridge takes to helping youth achieve their goals and their independence. With the leadership of the South Essex Community Centre (SECC), more youth are being connected to job paths.

One way The Bridge helps to support youth employment goals in partnership with SECC is through Job Fairs. These have become increasingly popular and well attended. In the past year more than 180 youth attended Job Fairs held in winter and summer. Job Fairs at the Resource Centre have been incredibly popular...



Youth that need it, also receive "light touch" case management services.

At The Bridge, we also pair youth who need it with trained staff. These workers meet youth where they are at, without judgment, helping them to address their needs and achieve their own goals by providing "light touch" case management and connecting them with a range of supports and services. From 2023 to 2024, the number of youth receiving case management as external clients of The Bridge more than tripled, increasing from 13 to 45. Referrals for housing supports, mental health services, and employment assistance were the most common from 2023 to 2024.

# HOUSING



A place to call home...

At The Bridge, we understand that all youth need a place to call home and that "home" is the basis for stability and growth. Our Supportive Housing Program connects youth to safe housing and ultimately a path from supportive housing that best meets their needs. At the same time, our new Semi-independent Housing Program and growing Attainable Housing initiative are extending the opportunity for a stable place to call home beyond supportive housing and into the community.


# **Supportive Housing**

What it is	✓ The Supportive Housing Program runs out of the Quiring Family Fresh Start Housing Facility and houses youth 16 to 24 experiencing homelessness or housing instability for up to a year providing wrap around supports.	
What it includes	<ul> <li>Safe place to live</li> <li>Access to resource centre programs</li> <li>Case management services</li> <li>Transition support to independent living</li> <li>Family re-integration support</li> </ul>	
Why it is important	✓ Providing immediate housing and supports reduces the risk of chronic homelessness, while also teaching skills that build the foundation for life after supportive housing based on the unique needs and goals of each youth.	

#### The need for youth supportive housing is there and growing.

Since the Supportive Housing program opened its doors, need has grown. The number of youth in supportive housing rose from 15 to 22 from 2023 to 2024 while the number on the waiting list tripled.

The average number of days in supportive housing also rose from 2023 to 2024. Overall, however, an average of one third of youth move out of supportive housing within 3 months, another third within 6 months, and the final third within 10 months.






#### Supportive housing provides referral and wrap around supports to help youth meet their needs and learn the skills they need to live independently.

Housing is only one part of what the Supportive Housing Program represents. Youth are also connected with a wide range of referral services to provide additional assistance with life and coping skills, employment, education, primary care, mental health, addiction and spiritual care.

They also receive training and certification opportunities related to financial literacy, job skills, tenant rights, and educational attainment. On average, youth in Supportive Housing learn between 3 and 5 new skills during their time in the program.




#### Caring doesn't end with supportive housing.

Supportive housing is only the beginning of the journey for many youth. Moving to independence is an important end goal of the Supportive Housing Program. Helping to ensure youth become and remain stably housed and continue to move toward their goals is the focus of the after-care program.

While some youth carry over their time in supportive housing across reporting years, in general youth take many paths upon leaving supportive housing.

Some move to semiindependent housing at The Bridge, while others go on to fully independent living. Some return to their families or to host families. A portion of youth return to high school or enter post-secondary education. Some youth will also choose to formally take part in our after-care program.



Remaining housed after supportive housing is an important marker of success for The Bridge and a goal of the After-care Program. However, follow-up data is difficult to obtain once youth leave supportive housing since not all elect to take part in the After-care Program. For example, from 2022 to 2024, the percentage of youth with follow up data dropped from 56% at 30 day follow-up to 13% at 12 month follow-up. What we do know is that of the 33 youth in the Supportive Housing Program between 2022 and 2024, 100% of those with follow up data were still housed 12 months after leaving the program.

# Semi-independent Housing Program

Why it is important	✓ Some youth leaving the Supportive Housing Program may require additional supports and continue to be at risk of homelessness and housing insecurity. This program bridges supportive and independent living.	

#### Here's what the program is all about.

This is a new and exciting pilot project at The Bridge! Still in its first year, the Semi-Independent Housing program offers a transitional home for those clients who are not yet ready for fully independent living. In addition to housing, they have access to all Resource Centre services, such as the food pantry and hot meals, and other nearby essential services. They also receive support from dedicated case workers who walk alongside residents as they plan, budget, and set timelines to meet their long-term housing goals.

Just as importantly, residents are encouraged and supported to create their own personal development plans to reach their full potential. At present, there are 4 youth in the Semi-Independent Housing Program, and we are eager to provide updates as the program progresses and more data is available.

#### Program Requirements

- $\checkmark$  18 to 24 years of age
- ✓ Notice of assessment from previous tax year
- ✓ Follow terms of occupancy while in supportive housing program
- ✓ Have and retain a job for at least 3 months
- ✓ Have a clear and defined housing plan
- ✓ Current CHR application
- ✓ Proof of tenant insurance
- ✓ Sem-independent handbook completed

#### Program Expectations

- ✓ Mandatory weekly case worker meetings in the first months of occupancy, moving to biweekly then monthly
- ✓ Monthly health and safety checks
- ✓ Continue to work and maintain employment
- ✓ Work on housing and personal development goals independently
- ✓ Work alongside housing workers (New Beginnings or SAPACCY) for housing plan following occupancy agreement

# **Attainable Housing**

What it is	✓ Our growing "Tiny Home Community" initiative provides safe and inclusive community housing adjacent to Bridge property with mid-level and market rate options for both youth in transition and community priority populations.	
What it includes	<ul> <li>✓ 12 tiny homes with up to 50 homes planned</li> <li>✓ Walking distance to amenities and transportation</li> <li>✓ Focus on priority populations including seniors, youth, Indigenous peoples and Black Canadians, and women</li> </ul>	
Why it is important	✓ There is a local affordable housing crisis with more than one third of renter households in Windsor-Essex living in housing that is not affordable to them as of 2021. Finding creative ways to fill the affordable housing gap is vital.	0

#### The Bridge is committed to closing the attainable housing gap.

Over the last few years, The Bridge has been moving towards its next strategic plan initiative which includes building a 50-unit tiny home development. This development is located on the current Bridge site and is within walking distance of many local amenities, including the public transportation system, shopping, medical services, schools, banks, parks, and recreation facilities.

This new "Tiny Home Community" initiative not only provides a space for youth to transition once they have been part of the supportive housing facility but is also aimed at helping to close the attainable housing gap in this region, particularly for those most marginalized.

#### The Attainable Housing Gap

There is a local housing crisis and attainable housing gap. According to the 2021 census, approximately 35% of renter households in Windsor-Essex are spending 30% of their income or more on rent, meaning they are living in housing that is not affordable for them. As well, systemically marginalized groups at greater risk.

# ...more than a third of the local population cannot afford the average apartment rent.

To fill the current housing gap and account for population growth and changes, Windsor-Essex would need almost 13,000 additional affordable rental housing units by 2028.

# Through support and partnership, we have been making good on our commitment.

#### TINY HOME COMMUNITY TIMELINES



To start the development, The Bridge successfully received the Federal Rapid Housing Initiative grant for \$1.858 million in 2021 and raised over \$2.5 million to support the building of the initial 12 tiny homes, as well as the purchase of an adjacent two-acre property. Municipal zoning approvals were also obtained.

The first 4 homes were completed in late fall of 2022 and the remaining 8 homes were completed in the fall of 2023. The initial tenants were moved in during the winter of 2023 and the remaining tenants later that fall.


The Bridge has successfully managed these tenancies for over a year in alignment with the program goals of including priority population tenants, specifically seniors, youth, Indigenous peoples, Black Canadians, and women. The Bridge continues to see a need for more housing based on the number of applications that were received for these initial homes, which were well beyond the number of homes available for rent.


#### But we have not done this alone...

Without the support and generosity of a range of donors and funders, this work would not have happened. The Bridge greatly appreciates the enormous community support and ongoing donations. We are currently applying for RHC grant dollars to build 8 units that are pivotal to assisting The Bridge in starting the next phase of its project to build a total of 38 additional homes.


Take Your Shot has given youth the chance to soar since 2021.

In 2021, this competitive program began offering the chance for financial support for education or business to 17 to 29-year-olds in Windsor Essex and Chatham Kent. With opportunities to compete for educational scholarships or business development grants, Take Your Shot has supported 23 youth with more than \$165,00 in educational scholarships and 15 youth with more than \$115,000 in business start up monies for pitch winners from 2021 to 2024.



Take Your Shot participants get more than just money.

In addition to financial supports, Take Your Shot applicants are given the opportunity to develop skills through multiple workshops on topics such as finance, marketing, pitch development, and writing applications for scholarships and OSAP.



Here's how Take Your Shot made a difference for these 2024 winners.

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# Over the years, our partnerships have grown and changed to meet client needs.

Our partners make it possible to offer the wide range of wraparound services that position The Bridge as a youth hub.

From 2021 until now, our formal partnerships have grown from 12 to 15, with new partnerships in 2023-2024 broadening access to mental health and addictions supports and providing the ability to branch out into more comprehensive after-care and employment offerings.

As the needs of our youth have shifted over time, so too have the nature of our partnerships. While some have remained consistent, needs in other areas have necessitated new avenues for collaboration. The need for mental health and addiction services in particular has grown and as a result The Bridge has formed additional partnerships that can more clearly link youth to services in this area.



#### The broader community is also a partner and kept informed!

Engaging the community means keeping them informed about everything happening at The Bridge. Our social media presence is a huge part of that, and we use our engagement rates to give us a sense of how much the community interacts with our social media content. In particular, engagement rate by reach (ERR) measures the percentage of people who interact with content after seeing it. In general, a good engagement rate is between 1 and 5%.<sup>1</sup>

Our new strategic plan was built on a strong base.


